

2 Further Description of Important Features Georgian city hall with a slate gable roof. Across the front of the two and a half story center part of the building is a monumental limestone portico supported by six stone columns, two stories high, each turned out of a single piece of stone. A square clock tower sits in the center of the gable peak with a clock face on each side and on each side a twelve hundred pound bronze bell chimes the hour. (See page 2)		Photo	
3 History and Significance The City of Webster Groves was incorporated in 1896 and city offices were rented in a frame building on the corner of Lockwood and Gore that is gone now. In 1907 the City Hall moved into the Empire Building, 25 N. Gore, and in 1911 it moved into the west end of the Gorelock Building on the corner of Gore and Lockwood. In 1922 the City of Webster purchased the Congregational Church parsonage on the southeast corner of Lockwood (see page 2)		40 Visible from Public Road? 42. (continued) A one and a half story wing with a flat roof projects two bays on each side (east and west) of the center section contributing to the symmetry of the building. The double doors in the center of the front have a large fan light above them and the two large windows on either side of the center door are arched, repeating the arch of the center fan light. All windows are double hung and, except for the many-paned arched windows, are six over six with limestone sills and first story windows have decorative stone lintels. There is a limestone frieze across the front of the portico, there are limestone string courses above and below the first and second story windows, limestone articulates the edges of the roofs and there are limestone medallions above the first story windows in the one story wings.

The police department is located in the basement level of the wing which projects on the west and its entrance is on the west.

A new two story addition with a gable roof projects from the center of the rear (south) and houses the Webster Groves Fire Department. Large garage doors open for fire trucks along the west side facing Elm. There are garage doors on the east side for police cars and the second story is a large apartment for the firemen.

43. (continued) conducted city business from that large frame house until 1932 when money raised in the bond issue of 1931 was used to fund the new city hall designed by architects Hugo K. Graf, Charles L. Thurston and Wilber T. Trueblood. Wilber Trueblood had been the partner of Theodore Link, architect of Union Station, and he became the partner of Hugo Graf when Link died in 1923. Hugo Graf lived in Webster.

In 1973 the large wing was added on the south for the fire department. It was designed by architects Frosse, Maack and Becker and consolidated the men and equipment from Fire House No. 1 on Lockwood near Gore and Fire House No. 2 in Old Orchard.



There is a monumental limestone pedimented portico supported by four limestone Doric columns and two limestone pillasters projecting in front of the center three bays. 43 History and Significance
 The Masonic Temple of Webster Groves was build in 1922 by Kremer and Veiroi and was originally attached to the old frame Plant home. In 1961 the two-story frame house was torn down and the front added.
 Free Masonry first came to Webster Groves in 1868 when a charter was granted to Grove Lodge No. 296. It disbanded six years later. In 1897 Webster Groves (see page 2)

44 Description of Environment and Outbuildings
 The Masonic Temple sits far back from the street with a large lawn, in the front and on the east side of the property. A parking lot shared with the city hall is on the west and the rear of the building backs up to the back of residential property.


Behind the front section of the building, connected by a two and three story brick passageway with a cross gable roof, is the large, older, Flemish bond, meeting hall. It is three stories high with a low, front facing gable roof. The first story windows are below the brick water table. The second, main story windows are tall, double hung, 9 over 9 with a six light transom above arranged in groups of 3. The large third story windows are double hung, 12 over 12, and are recessed between tall brick arches. There is a limestone stringcourse between the second and third stories. There is a two story projection with a flat roof on the back.

43. (continued) U.D. was founded with Worshipful Brother Joseph H. Trembley as its first Master. The Lodge met on the first floor of Brannon Hall on North Gore and then in the new Bristol Building at Lockwood and Gore and then in the Empire Building on North Gore. The present location was purchased in 1914.

Civil War. The only other Congregational church in the state of Missouri at that time was the First Congregational Church of St. Louis, partly because Congregationalism was associated with New England and abolitionism.



and his children lived here. He had twins, Edgar and Edith, who served as an airforce lieutenant and a Red Cross nurse during World War I. He also had an older daughter. Mr. Ferguson and his daughter Edith, both died in 1918 and Mrs. Ferguson married Mr. Trembly.

In 1920 the Webster Groves YWCA purchased the building. The young women operated a tea room on the first floor and had rooms to rent on the second floor. They had clubs and classes and a choral group and they ran an employment bureau and room registry for housewives. The YWCA closed after a year because of finances.

In 1923, Laura Parker purchased the house and converted it to an undertaking establishment and lived upstairs. He husband had founded Parker's Livery and Undertaking in 1889 on North Gore Ave.

The front of the original house faces south and contains three bays. It has doors in the center bay on the first floor and on the second floor. The main entrance has sidelights and had a transom but it has been filled in with panelling. The second story door opens onto a small wrought iron balcony. The window frames have cornices and black shutters, and the front of the house and all of the additions are covered with aluminum siding.

On the west side of the house one can see the brackets with tear drops and dentils between that are under all of the eaves of the roof of the old house. behind these buildings, where the parking lot is now, that was used for a jail. He said it was painted dark red and folks called it the "red onion".

The Gorelock Buildings on either side of the post office were built in 1911 for the Gorelock Realty Company. The corner store seems to have been a drug store all of its life. It was the Liggett Drug Company before the '20s and then a Rexall Drug Company and then a Glasers and now Don Sundhausen has an independent drug company there. Until the late 1950's there was an ice cream soda fountain in the back.

The westernmost store was for many years a hardware store. McCurdy Brothers Hardware was there first and then Al Miller and his partner ran Gorelock Hardware until the 1970's.

The second floors of both buildings are offices and have housed dentists and others.

The post office was moved to larger quarters further east on Lockwood and the building at 107 W Lockwood was modernized for a 5 and 10¢ store. As Woolworths and then as Ben Franklin's it went back and made an L around the corner drug store and had an entrance from North Gore Ave. It was a small independent dime store in the sixties and finally gave up to the large discount stores.
