



A search of the County Histories and other material suggest that part of the homes could be grouped into a historic district. The homes for possible inclusion are located at: 105 N. 19th, and 119 N. 19th or Community Development numbers A-04-20 and A-04-36. These homes should be attached to the homes in the block immediately to the West as the William T. Harris Historic District. The home at 102 N. 20th has no relationship to the district and stands by itself as a ranch style in an older neighborhood.







221 N. 18th (C-01-03); 206 N. 19th (B-01-01); 208 N. 19th (B-01-02);

and 1815 Francis (B-01-03) have historic significance and should be connected with the William T. Harris Historic District which is located in the block directly south of both of these structures. The other homes in this block survey represent a variety of styles, but they can be duplicated in several other block surveys. There is not enough symmetry in this block to include it in the William T. Harris Historic District.



There is not enough symmetry in this block to include it in the William T. Harris Historic District.

This Queen Anne style home has several outstanding features. The south and north windows in the attic level are palladian. In the east end of the attic gable, there are two small attenuated windows. In the southeast corner the upper window panes has X shaped lattice covers in the window. The double wide window on the east side has a leaded glass upper sash. This same pattern is repeated on the double wide window on the first floor. (see appendix)							
Mr. Stringfellow was a member of a well known family in the City of St. Joseph. He was sometime vestryman of Christ Episcopal Church and was president of Graham, Stringfellow Implement Co., at the time this house was constructed. The home cost \$5,600 to build.





The bricks in the chimney are corbelled. On the second floor there are patterned windows in the upper sash. There are round muttons with radiating cross spindles. The entrance is accentuated with a special treatment of Tuscan columns and a shell in terra cotta. There are other terra cotta bric-a-brac in other areas.

42. Further Description of Important Features

This Queen Anne style brick home was built in 1888 at a cost of \$5,000. The cornice is a pressed tin. The corners of the roof have distinct ornaments which end in a flower leaf pattern. windows are slightly attenuated. They are divided into three segments and the upper segment is half eliptical with a radiating voussoir. There is stained glass used in portions of the windows on the first floor. (see appendix)

John Shireman, Jr., the builder was a clothier in 1888. He was a partner in Tootle, Shireman and Co., which was located in Market Square.

This \$550 addition might have had balustrades in 1902, but only a section on the north shows this evidence today.



The porch ends in a second floor level balustrade of brick and terra cotta. The front door is encompassed in a tower which ends in a third floor level porch. The tower has stone columns with medieval capitals carved in a foliate pattern and prominent abacus blocks at both the second and third floor levels. There are stained glass windows in the second floor area. The tower ends in a steep conical shaped roof and is topped by a finial.

There are terra cotta reliefs used on the north, west and south walls. This is also used as decoration in the semi-circular arch over the double wide window in the west wall. The west wall ends in a terra cotta relief at the third floor level and is topped by a shell carving and foliate finial. Corbelled brick is also used at the third floor level and in the chimneys. Stained glass is used extensively in the upper sashes and transoms at several windows. There is a solid stained glass window in the south wall.

Gable dormers protrude from all sides of the house. On the south, one dormer opens out onto a porch which is topped by a pediment roof portion. This section is over a curved bay which is part of the first and second floor plan.

There is a carpenter trim wooden porch on the rear, (southeast) corner of the house. This leads into an area that is surrounded by a lattice fence. At one time this area contained a small patio area and lead to a carriage house that has been demolished.

## #43 Appendix

Moving to St. Joseph in 1867 or 1868, he became involved in the flour milling business. In 1891, he purchased the Aunt Jemima Manufacturing Co., and improved the pancake mix invented by Chris Rutt and Charles G. Underwood. The mix was named for a popular cakewalk tune. The pancake mix was introduced to the public of the U.S. at the Worlds Fair in Chicago in 1893. Nancy Green played the role of Aunt Jemima and made free pancakes for all who cared to test them. Davis died at his home in 1894. The Aunt Jemima Mills were sold to Quaker Oats in 1926. Davis was the uncle of W. True Davis, Jr. former ambassador to Switzerland and currently a businessman in Washington, D.C.







The double dormer in the attic is embellished with brackets at wide eaves. There is a balcony like treatment of the dormer. A belcast hip roof is above the wide eaves. There is a two story bay on the West with rusticated brick at the corners at every other course. There is a four course water table at the base of the first floor. On the second story there are four decorative belt courses of brick raised from the wall surface. There is also a raised belt course of brick immediately below the entablature on the second story which runs around the whole of the building. Raised brick also surrounds the bulls' eye window.

There is a concrete attached garage at the Southwest corner of the house. The roof of the garage forms a back porch floor surface for the first story.

The roof is steep with numerous cross gables with palladian or medium palladian windows in the end of every gable. There are paired columns with fan brackets that dominate the large porch railing in monochrome-blue and white with lathed curved rails and spindles.

There is a transom above the door with diamond shaped panes of glass in the transom and side lights. Leaded glass is also used in the central bay of the first and second floor facade.

There is a one story porch on the rear of the house.

The Charles Campbell family lived at 1823 Francis to the east on the corner from 1869 through at least 1889. The 1897 Sanborn Fire Insurance Map shows 1823 Francis as still standing and 1815 Francis, this house, not yet built. The 1911 Sanborn Map shows that by that year, 1823 had been demolished and that 1815 Francis had been built. 1900 was the last year 1823 Francis appeared in the City Directory. The first year 1815 Francis appeared in the City Directory was 1902. The first listed resident was Roland K. Smith, Assistant Superintendentof the Burlington Route. The following year a different resident, George Colins with the Wyeth Hardware Co., was listed here. This excellent example of the late Queen Anne style is well intact and would contribute significantly to the establishment of an historic district in the Harris Addition area of high quality 19th and early 20th Century residential buildings.



A famous example of this style in the United States, Boston Public Library, was completed in 1895 and it is not idle speculation to think that the committee and architects were influenced by it in (over) 43 History and Significance The Public Library and Board of Education building was the crowning

achievement of a campaign by a group of civic-minded women led by Mrs. John S. Lemon, Mrs. T.F. VanNatta, and Mrs. George Hull. Their pioneer effort to establish a library in 1887 by soliciting annual gifts of \$50.00 from patrons met with success for a year or two, but not surprisingly, such financing proved inadequate.

The entrances and other features are identical. The entrance is incorporated in an arcade of three classic arches with supporting stone pillars. "Erected by the School District 1900" is inscribed on the exterior entrance wall.

The interior walls are marble, as are the steps leading up to the door. Inside, the striking feature is the curved Tennessee marble stair with heavy ornamental iron balustrade. This stair leads to the second floor rotunda, which is topped with a clear glass dome. The plaster walls of the rotunda are decorated with ornamental pilasters, moldings, and classic decorative motifs.

A circular balustrade of ornamental wrought iron in the center of the rotunda floor surrounds a stained glass window through which light from the dome above is filtered into the lobby. This never fails to elicit favorable comment from visitors.

Throughout the building, the heavy oak woodwork, wainscoating and pedimented doorways are still impressive. The lobby, with marble wainscoating and well-placed columns and pilasters, leads into the book stack area. A second level for books is provided by a wrought iron and steel balcony with glass flooring.

The stone veneer exterior has been pressure cleaned, coated with color and waterproofed, giving the building its original fine appearance. On account of the slope of the lot, the view from the west shows three full stories. Fireproof construction of steel and concrete was used on the roof, on top of which are red Spanish tile.

In 1918, an annex of several rooms was added to the building in a style compatible to the original.

An elevator has been installed recently, making the entire building accessible to the handicapped. As restoration proceeds, there is every reason to believe that the building will serve its purpose another 80 years.

It was characteristic of St. Joseph's pioneers in the public library movement to enclose their educational center in the quiet dignity of a classical style.

#43 cont'd.

In the librarian's report for 1902, he states, "The new building is a result of a '10 year war' waged by friends and believers in the library movement." Purd Wright, the city clerk impressed by the city-wide interest in a free library, began to circulate petitions to obtain a 3/10 of a mill tax. In 1891, it was approved by the voters 6 to 1.

But, in a rented house, the library soon needed more space. The state law at that time did not recognize a library as a legal entity qualified to propose a bond issue for a permanent home. The library board asked the school board for aid. A committee was appointed in 1899 composed of three members of the library board and three school board members to plan for a building which would serve as a library with offices of administration for the school district on the second floor. A bond issue of \$100,000 was submitted to the voters March 31, 1900. It passed 2,512 to 561. Construction began early in 1901 after some delay in obtaining steel from Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. The building opened March 13, 1902. The actual cost was \$97,000.

An innovation at the opening was a separate children's library, a first in northern Missouri.

The library, in the first half of this century, was a center for information and assistance to as many as 50 study clubs and organizations of both men and women. These serious adults were ambitious to acquire more education for both career and social advancement. Before school libraries existed, all extra-curricular reading and research material was obtained at the library. The reference department, with 11,000 volumes, was used daily by students of the St. Joseph Junior College for many years.

In 1907, the library was designated a United States Government Depository of the publications of the Government Printing Office. The collection now contains 78,024 items.

In the files of the Superintendent's Office are records of thousands of students from 1854 to the present. These are consulted frequently by citizens in need of birth certificates or whose interest is in genealogy.

#44 cont'd.

One half block to the north is the Pony Express Statue and the Civic Center Park. The park provides the setting for another handsome building in the Renaissance style, the City Hall.

Across the street to the east is a high-rise apartment building for senior citizens. Built over a section of the Library Square parking lot is the Municipal Senior Citizens' Center.

To the west in a modern building is the Platt Business and Technical College. There are no outbuildings of any kind.
