Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

**Description** 

Highlighting the U-shaped Dockery Hotel is an ornate pressed metal 2nd story front facade which wraps around the NE corner of the building. The bracketed cornice extends along the N facade where there are 2 polygonal 2nd story bay windows, which also have pressed metal decoration (see photo 1). The decorative facade of this brick structure has unusual corner columns with enlarged capitals & piers. This motif also flanks the attenuated 1/1 windows. The wall surface is covered with a dressed stone patterned metal & beneath the brackets in the cornice is a fan detail (see photos 2-3). When the building was constructed it originally was the 2 story NE section. It was enlarged by adding a 2 story ell to the rear of this section (see construction line just to the left of the bay windows in photo 4) and by adding an L-shaped section to its S & SW. The total building then formed a U shape with an open courtyard to the rear. The additions were built to complement the original: windows continued the segmental arch headers & general shape & size on the N, S & W facades. The later front facade was set back and a tall wooden gallery with 2nd story balustrade extended across both sections. Due to the widening of city streets the portion of the gallery across the original section was removed & the 1st story facade was slightly altered. In recent years part of the gallery (N end) was enclosed & made into a sleeping room, however the original facade remains intact. A number of 1st story, N facade windows have been temporarily enclosed (see photo 4). The interior retains its general floor plan, but most of the decorative embellishments have been removed through the years. Millwork, stairs & doors are of oak.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Dockery Hotel possesses significance for its historical associations with the life of Thomas Jefferson Dockery, a prominent citizen of Kirksville, Missouri (Criterion B) and because it illustrates a type of commercial architecture characteristic of rural Missouri at the turn of the century (Criterion C). Further explanation of the areas of significance are included below:


ARCHITECTURE: The Dockery Hotel is the finest example of the use of a decorative pressed metal facade extant in the City of Kirksville & is typical of early hotel architecture as it existed in the Midwest. Originally built as the Leslie Hotel, a smallish, 2 story rectangular structure, it contained a large lobby with rooms above. Its period of promenience was after it was enlarged in 1904 by T.J. Dockery, however these additions continued to use the architectural motifs established by the early period of construction. At the time of its enlargement it was considered "beautiful structure with 75 elegantly furnished rooms" and the front was embellished by a "beautiful veranda 150' long & 14' wide making it look very much like an old fashioned southern inn". The extensive pressed metal facade & cornice, & the U-shaped brick structure embody the distinctive characteristics of commercial architecture built at the turn of the century using the most modern methods of construction & prefabrication of materials.

SOCIAL/HUMANITARIAN, POLITICS/GOVERNMENT: Little is known of the orginial owner/operator, Mr. Leslie. The significance of the structure is most generally associated with Thomas Jefferson Dockery, who was born in Lawrence County, Indiana in 1845 & came to Adair County, Missouri with his parents, John & Mary, in 1855. He served in the Union forces from 1861 to 1864. Julia E. Linder became his bride in 1867 & bore him 3 children. During these early years T.J. Dockery taught school & farmed. In 1876 he was elected to a county office & moved his family to Kirksville. He served as County Surveyor & Bridge Commissioner for 8 years, during which time he platted the rural settlements of Adair (1879) & New Baden (1881). Dockery became a man of wealth through his land investments & his Real Estate & Abstract businesses. He also built & owned several of the most substantial commercial ventures in Kirksville, including the Dockery Building & the Dockery Hotel. Prominent in local politics, he served several terms on the City Council & 2 terms as Mayor (1899-1900, 1903-1905). Other political connections included serving 8 years as County Chairperson, as a delegate to the State convention at numerous times, & in 1900 he was selected as a delegate to the Republican National Convention. It is suspected that it was due to Dockery's policital associations, that Wm. Jennings Bryant spoke from the Dockery Hotel during his 1907 presidential campaigning trip. Thomas Jefferson Dockery played an important part in the commercial & political life of Kirksville, Missouri until his death in November of 1922.

COMMERCE: Chartered as a town in 1857, the City of Kirksville was soon to become the trade center for NE Missouri. Ten years later, Joseph Baldwin established his North Missouri Normal School & Commercial College which would become the 1st District State Normal School & later known as Northeast Missouri State University. The railroads arrived in Kirksville in 1868 & 1872 at which time the city's commercial ventures prospered. The next major increase for the town developed around the establishment of Osteopathic Medicine. Dr. A.T. Still returned to Kirksville in 1875 & soon had a thriving practice. He also traveled around the State explaining his theory & treating patients. As his fame grew, so grew the City of Kirksville. Several hotels & boarding houses were erected to handle the large number of patients crowding the Kirksville community. Oral history indicates such is the case of the original Leslie Hotel. Supposedly it was developed with a large lobby so that the growing number of Dr Still's patients had a place to gather. In 1892, A.T. Still opened the American School of Osteopathy, however the 1st infirmary was not built unit1 1894, which explains the need for hotels & boarding houses. Of the numerous hotels meeting this need which included the Pool House, the Ivie Hotel, the Central, & the Steele, only the Leslie/Dockery remains. According to oral history, Leslie may have borrowed money from T.J. Dockery to finance his venture & upon not being able to meet the notes, Dockery then became the owner, Whatever the circumstances, T.J. Dockery acquired the hotel in 1895 & seeing the growing need for such a commercial venture, he made the enlargement & reopened the building as the Dockery Hotel on December 21, 1904. The next year, the ASO Hospital was constructed.

The Dockery Hotel, with its gallery, decorative metal facade, & 1st class interior, hosted a variety of Kirksville guest. By 1900 the business district had completely surrounde the courthouse square & extended 1 block in every direction. Complementing educational, commercial & medical ventures of Kirksville, the Dockery Hotel and its owner Thomas Jefferson Dockery played an integral role in the prosperity of the community.

NOTE: The Dockery Hotel has continued to serve Kirksville throughout the years. Currently it is being used as a hotel & residential units, the bus depot & a tavern. Its physical condition has deteriorated. Located just off the square, but in a commercial area, the hotel sits on 4 of block 24, the South 5 of which is filled by the Kirksville College of Osteopathi Medicine. Its urban setting does not allow for landscaping. No outbuildings are associated with it. The Dockery Hotel was recently acquired by new owners who are sympathetic to the integrity of the turn-of-the-century Kirksville landmark & rehabilitation plans are being discussed.
